
A Healthy School Climate is...

- Clearly communicated rules & norms
- Sense of physical security
- Sense of social & emotional security
- Respect for diversity
- Supportive and caring adult relationships for students
- Supportive and caring peer relationships
- Feeling connected to school



From Connecting the Dots

- Youth who feel connected and committed to school are at a lower risk of harming others through
 - dating violence,
 - youth violence,
 - and bullying,
 - and are at lower risk for suicide

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Broad Considerations

- Materials based on State and/or National standards of health education
- Effectiveness in behavior change demonstrated by evaluations
- Curricula content
- Culturally and community relevant



School Considerations

- Can materials be integrated into already existing curriculum?
- Can the curricula be adapted to different settings?
- Classroom teacher vs. outside instructor?



Teaching Considerations


- Multiple sessions



What is a Technical Package?

...a select group of strategies based on the <u>best available evidence</u> to help communities and states sharpen their focus on priorities with the <u>greatest</u> <u>potential</u> to reduce violence.





Structure of Technical Package

- A Technical Package has these components:
 - Strategies direction or actions to achieve the goal of preventing violence
 - Approaches specific ways to advance the strategy
 - Example programs, policies, or practices
 - Evidence impact on violence or its associated risk factors





Create Protective Environments

- Improving safety and monitoring in schools

- Addressing community-level risks through environmental approaches
 - Alcohol policies (outlet density, pricing)





Support Victims/Survivors to Lessen Harms

Victim-centered services

- Crisis intervention, medical and legal advocacy, access to community resources
- . Treatment for victims of SV
 - Trauma-focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT)
 - Cognitive Processing Therapy (CPT)
 - Prolonged Exposure Therapy (PET)





Support Victims/Survivors to Lessen Harms (cont.)

- Treatment for at-risk children and families to prevent problem behavior, including sex offending
 - Multisystemic Therapy–Problem
 Sexual Behavior (MST–PSB)
 - Children with Problematic Sexual Behavior Cognitive-Behavioral Treatment Program: School-Age Program (PSB–CBT)





Strengthen Economic Supports for Families

 - Income supports (e.g., tax credits, child care subsidies, cash transfers)
 - Microfinance programs
 - Comparable worth policies
- Strengthen work-family supports
 - Paid leave policies (parental, sick, vacation; job-protected)
