Child Assault Prevention (CAP) Project Washoe, Storey, Churchill & Lyon Counties	The Child Assault Prevention Project strives to empower children to be "Safe, Strong, and Free". Through education and prevention programs designed to increase children's safety from bullying, abuse and assault, CAP is committed to breaking the cycle of abuse in our community. CAP facilitators present the interactive workshop in each individual classroom and engage the children in discussion, songs, role-plays, and demonstrations. The program addresses bullying, stranger dangers, internet predators, cyberbullying and how to recognize and ward off physical and sexual abuse.
	Their website lists three programs focused on second, fourth, and sixth grades. For the second grade program helps children to recognize dangerous situations and keep themselves safe and promotes the belief that we are all responsible to empower children with strength and confidence. The fourth grade program teaches children to watch out for tricks and persuasive tactics that can be used to lure them into dangerous situations and teaches acceptance and understanding of disabilities and diversity. The sixth grade program helps students realize the negative side of social media including the permanence of posts on the web and encourages awareness of how actions and words can have devastating effects on others. 	Washoe County has received funding for "Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters" (HIPPY) program. HIPPY USA is based on 25 years of research and the HIPPY model has proven to be effective in improving school readiness, parent involvement, school attendance, classroom behavior and academic achievement for children participating in the program. This evidence-based home visiting program is designed to improve child outcomes by supporting the parents in their role as the child's first and most important teacher.
	The HIPPY USA Curriculum is designed for children ages two to five, with 30 weekly activity packets, nine storybooks and a set of 20 manipulative shapes for each year. In addition to these basic materials, supplies such as scissors and crayons are provided for each participating family. The HIPPY USA program has trained coordinators and community- based home visitors who role-play activities with parents as well as support parents with community resources as needed.

	The HIPPY parents will become the facilitator in the learning process with their child. In addition, parents will gain confidence through their own participation in the HIPPY program and will eventually become comfortable expanding the activities and broadening the learning experiences for their child.

Bystander Intervention Training of Trainers Curriculum Developed and adapted from the evidence-based, Green Dot Program and was modified to fit high schools	Bystander Intervention Training (formerly Step Up Stop Violence) incorporates bystander strategies along with widespread public awareness campaign that would be likely to engage adolescents and young adults to not only identify potentially high risk violent situations, but also to safely intervene to prevent violence from occurring. The bystander approach begins by speaking out against ideas and behaviors that promote and tolerate violence. A commitment to stop violence can turn a once apathetic bystander into an engaged ally that discourages victim blaming and promotes safer options to intervene and prevent violence from happening.

When researching bystander literature and strategies for adoption in Nevada, it was evident that Green Dot had the preliminary scientific basis and academic approach that would increase the likelihood of success for preventing and reducing the number of violent incidents in Nevada. 	In 2019, NCEDSV began an initiative to address the issue of sexual violence against young adults with developmental disabilities. There is a wide range of disabilities, but developmental disabilities have a higher rate of sexual violence than other types so our focus was on this category to begin our public education campaign. With the help of an advisory council, NCEDSV created a webpage with resources that would help service providers, peer educators, and parents of children with developmental disabilities. Prevent Child Abuse Nevada at the Nevada Institute for Children's Research and Policy	Recognize & Report Child Maltreatment: Child maltreatment is not selective; it exists in all segments of our society. This training will teach individuals how to recognize characteristics of child maltreatment in children and abusive parents, defining a mandated reporter, identifying steps in reporting suspected child maltreatment, and resources for families and caregivers.

Through training, education, policy change, and cultural shift, Enough Abuse works to end child sexual abuse in our communities. This is aimed at adults, including Parents, Youth-Serving Organization staff, the Medical Community, School staff, Clergy and the Faith Community, and others.

	Sexual Assault 101 (also available in Spanish)
	This 1 – 1.5-hour training is available to general community members, and is great for college students, parent groups, religious institutions, and others.
	This introductory presentation helps attendees understand the nature and scope of sexual violence in our communities. Attendees will have a better understanding of what sexual violence is, the difference between consent and coercion, and the many resources of Signs of Hope and other local and national organizations for people who may have experienced sexual violence. 	Preparing to Teach about Violence Prevention
	This 1.5 – 3-hour training program is designed to assist K-12 School Staff and Administration in effectively preparing to teach Personal Safety and Violence Prevention in accordance with the Department of Education Health Standards.
	This training focuses on how the entire school community can engage in creating a safer space for students while teaching the prevention of sexual violence in all of its forms. Attendees will develop an understanding of the different forms of sexual violence, how it impacts students and learning, and how to create trauma-informed spaces. This training prepares schools to implement the child safety standards that mandates sexual violence curriculum be taught in all K-12 schools by giving school staff background knowledge and awareness about sexual violence and the impact of trauma.

	YourSPACE Middle School
	The intended audience for this program is 8 th Grade students. The program includes 5 – 50-minute class sessions.
	The YourSPACE Program focuses on educating and empowering youth to understand and recognize the hallmarks of healthy relationships to prevent victimization and perpetration, and how to serve as active bystanders to safely intervene in cases of potential violence. The program is age appropriate, gender inclusive, and does not include elements of sexual education.
	The program includes modules on: Social Norms and Objectification, Health and Unhealthy Relationships, Emotional Intelligence, Sexual Harassment and Intervention, Day 5 – Optional but strongly recommended- Technology and Human Trafficking. This program has been reviewed by the Clark County School District. Contact their office for more information.
	YourSPACE High School
	The target audience for this program is students in 9 th -12 th grade. This program occurs over the course of four-five 50 minute classes (5 th class is optional).
	The YourSPACE Program focuses on educating and empowering youth to understand and recognize the hallmarks of healthy relationships, and give them an understanding to help prevent victimization and perpetration, and how to safely intervene in cases of potential violence. The program is age appropriate, gender inclusive, and does not discuss the same elements of sexual education.
	Topics for the program include: Equality = Nonviolence, Coercion is NOT Consent, Dating and Sexual Violence, Active Bystander Intervention, and Technology and Human Trafficking. The program has been reviewed by the Clark County School District and meets several specific standards within the health curriculum for the department of education. Contact their office for more information.
	Care for Kids
	The target audience for Care for Kids are students in Pre-K – 2 nd Grade. Each module lasts 30 minutes.
	Care for Kids is a developmentally targeted, trauma-informed abuse prevention program for pre-school and elementary school communities. The program focuses on building children's healthy relationship skills through a series of six multi-modal and experiential lessons. The curriculum teaches children protective factors such as self-esteem, identifying and expressing emotions and anatomically correct terms for body parts.
	Lessons include: Asking for Help, Feelings, Understanding our Bodies, Babies, Asking for Permission, Conclusions.
	The program includes a Training of Trainers Model, where Signs of Hope staff can train school teachers, counselors, or other school staff to teach the program. Contact their office for more information. CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE

Child Assault Prevention Program (CAP)
This program is offered in elementary schools with a target audience of 1 st -3 rd Graders. The program lasts approximately 90 minutes.
This interactive workshop includes teaching children their rights to be safe from all harm. Students learn empowerment skills to protect themselves from bullies and other abusers, and are taught ways to keep themselves safe from strangers, including those on the internet. We help children recognize tactics that abusers use to trick kids into victimization (which includes people they know and/or love), and discuss safe, healthy body boundaries which include the topics of safe touch vs. unsafe touch as well as safe secrets vs. unsafe secrets. This program has been reviewed by the Clark County School District. Contact their office for more information.
We Care Elementary
The intended audience for the program is students in 3 rd -6 th Grades. Each module is 30 minutes in length.
We Care Elementary is a developmentally targeted, trauma-informed sexual abuse prevention program for elementary school communities. We Care Elementary focuses on building children's healthy relationship skills through multimodal, highly experiential lessons. The program focuses on different topics at each grade level that address the risk and protective factors related to victimization and perpetration.
3 rd Grade: Communicating and Understanding Feelings
4 th Grade: Understanding Personal Boundaries
5 th Grade: Recognizing Boundaries in Others
6 th Grade: Understanding Sexual Harassment
We Care Elementary offers a Training of Trainers Model where RCC staff will provide training to teachers, counselors and other school staff to be able to teach the program. Contact their office for more information.
Teaching Personal Safety Standards
Signs of Hope is offering two courses on this topic. One for elementary and another for secondary teachers. In this course the teacher will be learning how to address the new Personal Safety Standards within the Department of Education's Nevada Health Standards. These newly approved Standards are meant to address additional aspects of child safety including sexual violence and abuse. Due to the sensitive nature of this topic, this course if offered to teachers to prepare for these Standards to be taught in the classroom. Course objectives: 1) Demonstrate an understanding of trauma and the impact it can have on students and teachers; 2) Understand different forms of sexual violence; 3) Understand and respond to the sexual behavior of children; 4) Illustrate best practices in creating a trauma-informed classroom; 5) Illustrate an understanding of how to respond to disclosures and the requirements of mandated reporting; and 6) Identify available resources for preventing sexual violence and responding to disclosures. VIOLENCE PREVENTION PROGRAM (kindergarten & elementary school) Kindergarten Yellow Dyno - 30 min. Students interact with Yellow Dyno to learn easy tips for staying safe, particularly with strangers. They will identify safe and unsafe behavior, learn to trust their instincts, ask trusted adults for help, practice safe distance, and that they have control over their bodies and have the right to say "no." Virtual recording available. 1St grade Bullying Prevention - 30 min. Through an interactive felt-board story, students will identify types of bullying and understand how a victim is affected by bullying. They will practice safe and healthy conflict resolution and take a stand to end bullying in their classroom/school with a pledge of understanding. Students will learn what to do and who to tell if they are a victim of, or witness to, bullying. Virtual recording available. 2nd grade Alternatives to Anger - 45-50 min. Students will understand the importance of emotions, including anger. They will learn how to recognize and manage angry feelings by practicing healthy communication and identifying positive conflict resolution through role plays. Students will also look at the issues of power and bullying, and focus on positive outlets for emotional stress. Virtual recording or video presentation available. 3rd grade Stranger Awareness - 45-60 min. Students will discuss who a stranger is and how to stay safe from strangers in all situations; including public, at home and on-line. In a creative project they will identify positive prevention, learn to say "no", trust their own instincts, and feel confident talking to trusted adults. 4th grade Alternatives to Anger - 45-60 min. Students will understand anger as a valid emotion. They will identify personal triggers, learn de-escalation techniques, practice assertive communication to manage conflict, and set personalized action steps. VIOLENCE PREVENTION PROGRAM (middle school) Virtual recordings or video presentations being developed.
6 th grade – Bullying/Sexual Harassment Prevention 2 hrs. /2 class periods. Students will identify the dynamics, causes, and consequences of bullying and sexual harassment. They will understand how bullying and sexual harassment are related, practice techniques to prevent and intervene (bystander behavior), as well as learn about people and resources to help them and others.
7th grade Teen Dating/Intimate Partner Violence Prevention and Healthy Relationships – 2 hours/2 class periods. Students will understand the dynamics of dating/intimate partner violence, power and control, and barriers to leaving an abusive relationship. They will look critically at "norms" in teen dating and identify characteristics of healthy relationships and warning signs to unhealthy relationships. Middle School along with Relationship Abuse Education includes the following Enrichment Activities: Students are engaged by viewing the Simpson's episode, "Bart's Girlfriend," and "In Their Own Words." Evaluations are completed by the teacher. Students complete a fill-in Power & Control Wheel, and answer questions relating to the episode: "Bart's Girlfriend". Local resources are included.
8th grade Sexual Assault Prevention and Healthy Relationships – 2 hours/2 class periods Students will learn to look critically at the myths and realities of sexual assault. They will define terms and understand the dynamics of sexual assault and consent. Student will then be able to understand various characteristic of healthy and unhealthy relationships and learn how to assert healthy boundaries within relationships.
VIOLENCE PREVENTION PROGRAM (high school)
Grades 9-12 - Presentation topics include: Sexual Harassment Prevention; Sexual Assault Prevention; Gender Stereotypes; Teen Dating/Intimate Partner Violence Prevention; and Healthy Relationships. Time: 1 hour/topic/total 3-4 class periods. Students will learn the roots of sexual violence and understand the dynamics and types of sexual harassment, sexual assault, and dating/intimate partner violence. They will learn to identify warning signs to unhealthy relationships, practice positive bystander behavior to prevent and intervene in violence, and learn to negotiate healthy relationships and set personal boundaries. Currently video recordings available for Teen Dating Violence Prevention, Sexual Assault and consent education, Healthy Relationships and Sex Trafficking.

ADDITIONAL EDUCATION OPTIONS Sierra Community House's Youth Empowerment Groups are intended to provide a safe space for student to discuss topics relevant to their lives, such as healthy friendships and relationships, managing emotions, respect, leadership and communication skills. There are 4 goals the groups hope to achieve: 1) create positive environments and communities; 2) promote healthy friendships/relationships and choices; 3) increase positive self-worth; and 4) engage and empower youth to speak out and model healthy lifestyles. Youth Empowerment Groups most commonly meet for 10 sessions, ideally for 45 minutes to an hour. Students are usually chosen for the group by the counselor and/or teacher. Space is provided on-campus for the group to meet. Because the group is unique, a variety of curricula are referenced to provide the most relevant and interesting topics and activities specific to each group.
Examples of the curricula used are, but not limited to: In Touch with Teens; Girls Circle; Life Skills Training; Young Women's Lives; Young Men's Work; MyStrength; Communities Empowering Youth; Mentors in Violence Prevention; Love is Not Abuse; and Choose Respect. Virtual Groups available.
All Grades: Internet Safety 30-60 min. Students will learn through age-appropriate discussion and activities about the benefits, misuses and dangers of technology. They will learn how to recognize the types of technological foul play and what to do/who to talk to if it occurs. Virtual presentations available.
Middle & High School: Personal Safety and Empowerment 1-2 hrs. Female students will learn skills to decrease their chances of becoming the victim of violence through awareness, assertiveness, and physical self-defense. Not currently available.
Parent/Staff Education: All Topics 1-2 hrs. Purpose is to educate and work with adults on topics pertinent to their children or students. Presentations include overviews, tips, and resources. Virtual presentations available.

	<i>The Nevada Gatekeeper Training Program</i> focuses on four specific populations: Lifespan (general), Youth, Elderly and Native American. The program can be used in special training environments such as Law Enforcement and Foster Care Agencies. These courses are designed for various durations: 1 1/2 hours, 2 hours, 4 hours and 8 hours
	(Train the Trainer). The objectives of this training are to increase one's knowledge, understanding of suicide, recognize warning signs, identify risk and protective factors, increase willingness and ability to intervene with a person at risk for suicide. This training will provide insight for interacting with survivors and identify referral resources.
	safeTALK—Suicide Alertness for Everyone
	<i>safeTALK</i> is a community-oriented suicide alertness workshop that prepares anyone over the age of 15, regardless of prior experience or training, to become a suicide-alert helper. This training allows for up to 40 participants and lasts 3-4 hours. After completion of <i>safeTALK</i> , participants will have the ability to recognize a person at risk for suicide and know how to connect them with a person trained in suicide first aid intervention or similar resources to keep the individual safe.
	ASIST (Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training)
	<i>ASIST</i> is a two-day intensive, interactive and practice-dominated course designed to help caregivers recognize and review risk, and intervene to prevent the immediate risk of suicide. It is by far the most widely used, acclaimed and researched suicide intervention training workshop in the world.
	Mental Health First Aid
	Just as CPR teaches how to assist an individual having a heart attack, <i>Mental Health First Aid</i> teaches how to assist an adult experiencing a mental health or substance use-related crisis. In this 8-hour course, participants learn risk factors and warning signs for mental health and addiction concerns, strategies for how to help someone in both crisis and non-crisis situations, and where to turn for help. The 8-hour training provides the skills needed to reach out and provide initial help and support to an adult who may be developing a mental health or substance use problem or experiencing a crisis.
	Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA)
	<i>Youth Mental Health First Aid</i> is an 8-hour training primarily designed for adults who interact with adolescents on a regular basis. The course teaches how to help young people experiencing mental health challenges or crises. It reviews the unique risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems in adolescents ages 12-18 and emphasizes the importance of early intervention. This course may be appropriate for older youth (16 and older) to encourage youth peer to peer interaction. Anyone who regularly works or interacts with youth-teachers, athletic coaches, mentors, juvenile justice professionals may find the course content useful.
