IMPORTANT 2026 DATES



2026 Primary Election

Tuesday, June 9, 2026

Early Voting Starts: May 23, 2026

Mail-In ballots must be postmarked by June 9th for the primary election.

2026 General Election

Tuesday, November 3, 2026

Early Voting Starts: October 20, 2026

Mail-In ballots must be postmarked by November 3rd for the general election.

Nevada sends every registered voter a mail-in ballot and allows voters to cast their vote by mail or by dropping off their ballots at county election offices, polling places, or designated drop boxes.

For both elections, ballots must be received by the county elections office before the close of polls on Election Day, typically around 7:00 p.m.

If you return your ballot by mail, it must be postmarked on or before Election Day.

VOTER REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS



In order to vote in Nevada, you must meet the following requirements:

- **U.S. Citizen**

Must be a United States citizen

- **Age Requirement**

Must be at least 17 years old (if preregistering to vote) or at least 18 years old by the date of the election (if registering to vote)

- **County Residency**

Must have continuously resided in your Nevada county at least 30 days before the election

- **Precinct Residency**

Must have continuously resided in your precinct at least 10 days before the date of the election

HOW TO REGISTER TO VOTE

There are four ways you can register to vote in Nevada:

• Online

- ✔ If you have a current and valid Driver's License or Identification Card issued by the Nevada Department of Motor Vehicles you may register online through the Nevada Secretary of State's online voter registration application.
- ✔ You can register online or make changes and update your current registration using the following link:

• In Person

- ✔ You may also register to vote at any Nevada Department of Motor Vehicles office, at the County Clerk or Registrar of Voters office, and on college campuses.

• By Mail

- ✔ You may download the voter registration form here:

- ✔ Once complete, print out the application and sign it
- ✔ The application can be mailed or hand delivered to the County Clerk or County Registrar of Voters in your county.

• Same Day Registration

- ✔ Same-day voter registration is now allowed in Nevada.
- ✔ You may register to vote in person the day of, during early voting or on election day.
- ✔ You must provide proper documentation that you are eligible to vote.
- ✔ Once deemed eligible, you may vote only at that polling place and must vote before leaving that polling place.
- ✔ A provisional ballot may be cast if the voter cannot prove their eligibility

**After you have successfully completed your voter registration, you will receive a voter registration card in the mail.
Make sure you verify that all of the information on the voter registration card is correct.**

NEVADA CONFIDENTIAL ADDRESS PROGRAM



The Nevada Confidential Address Program (CAP) is a program that helps victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, human trafficking and/or stalking from being located by the perpetrator through public records. CAP has two basic parts:

- **Fictitious Mailing Address**

A fictitious mailing address and confidential mail forwarding program

- **Confidential Voter Registration**

Confidential voter registration records

NRS 293.5002: FICTITIOUS ADDRESS

The Secretary of State shall establish procedures to allow a person for whom a fictitious address has been issued pursuant to domestic violence, sexual assault, human trafficking, and stalking, inclusive to:

- (a) Preregister or register to vote; and
- (b) Vote by absent ballot, without revealing the confidential address of the person.

VOTING IN PERSON

Early voting is easy in Nevada, and is available to every voter. Voters can vote at any location in their respective county where early voting is offered.



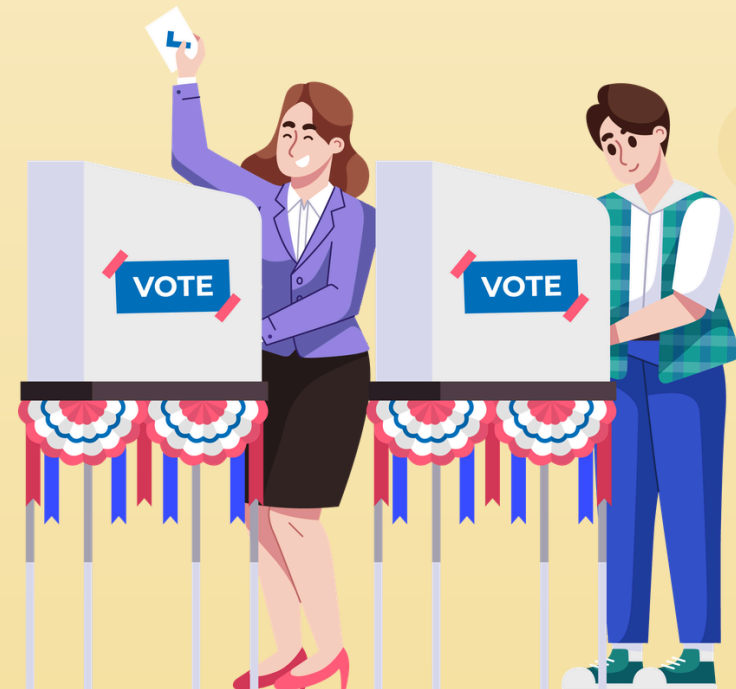
- **Assistance for Voters**

If you are a registered voter with a physical disability or inability to read or write English and are unable to mark and complete the ballot on your own, you are entitled to assistance from a consenting person of your choice. to help cast your ballot. ([NRS 293C.282](#))

- **Accessible Polling Places**

All polling places must be accessible to elderly or disabled voters. All polling places must have at least one booth that is wheelchair accessible and designated for use by elderly or disabled voters. This booth must contain the same privacy of other booths and be equipped with a mechanical recording device. ([NRS 293C.281](#))

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Nevada's Effective Absentee System for Elections (EASE) is an online application designed to support the needs of our "covered voters" including:

- ✔ Active duty members of the United States Armed Forces, their spouses and dependents
- ✔ Nevada voters who are outside of the country
- ✔ Nevada residents with a disability
- ✔ Tribal voters who live on a colony or reservation in Nevada

The system will be available for all state, county, and municipal elections no less than 46 days before Election Day and can be accessed at NVEASE.gov.

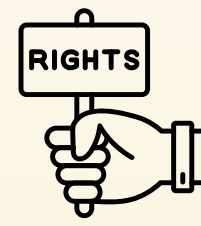
VOTER CHECKLIST

- ✔ Register to vote / update registration
- ✔ Apply for absentee ballot if needed
- ✔ Send in absentee ballot
- ✔ Confirm polling place location
- ✔ Research candidates and ballot questions
- ✔ Determine when you will go and how you will get there
- ✔ VOTE!

NEVADA VOTERS' BILL OF RIGHTS



As outlined in [NRS 293.2546](#), the Nevada Voters' Bill of Rights includes the following provisions:

- Each voter has the right to receive and cast a ballot that is written in a format that allows the clear identification of candidates, and accurately records the voter's preference in the selection of candidates.
- Each voter has the right to have his or her questions concerning voting procedures answered and to have an explanation of the procedures for voting posted in a conspicuous place at the polling place.
- Each voter has the right to vote without being intimidated, threatened or coerced.
- Each voter has the right to vote on Election Day if the voter is waiting in line at his or her polling place to vote before 7:00pm.
- Each voter has the right to return a spoiled ballot and is entitled to receive another ballot in its place.
- Each voter has the right to request assistance in voting, if necessary.
- Each voter has the right to a sample ballot which is accurate, informative and delivered in timely manner.
- Each voter has the right to receive instruction in the use of the equipment for voting during early voting or on Election Day.
- Each voter has the right to have nondiscriminatory equal access to the elections system, including, without limitation, a voter who is elderly, disabled, a member of a minority group, employed by the military, or a citizen who is overseas.
- Each voter has the right to have a uniform, statewide standard for counting and recounting all votes accurately.
- Each voter has the right to have complaints about election contests resolved fairly, accurately and efficiently.
